

The Atlantic City Branch has been invited to sponsor locally along with the League of Women Voters and the Atlantic County Citizens Council on Environment, a staging of the Community Land Use Game, developed at Cornell University. Prof. Ralph Smalley, Stockton College, will explain the workings of the game which is played on a map of Atlantic County. Participating players will be divided into teams and each team, starting with a sum of money, will buy land, pay tazes, build factories, residences, and stores, until the county is developed. NOVEMBER NEWS LETTER

A.A.U.W.

Dear Fellow Members:

Education will be the theme of the November meeting of the Atlantic City branch, American Association of University Women, to be held on Monday evening, November 18, at the home of Mrs. George Bond, 103 S. Avolyn Avenue, Ventnor.

Mrs. Herman Force, who teaches family relationships and social behaviour in the Toms River School and is associated with the experiments in progressive education in the school system of that community, will be the speaker. She is also publications chairman of the New Jersey State Division, A.A.U.W., and in charge of publishing the Bulletin.

Assisting Mrs. Bond, hostess for the November meeting, will be her daughter, Mrs. David Aiken, chairman of hospitality, and her committee, Mrs. Walter Bew, Miss Margaret Tilton and Dr. Elise Whitlock-Rose.

Everyone in A.A.U.W. should know of the international grants issued this year by the association to bring thirty-nine women students from European countries to enter colleges and universities in this country. Some are coming on the research fellowships that are a long-established part of the Association's program; thirty-three will receive emergency International Study Grants raised by the A.A.U.W. as a postwar reconstruction project for women of liberated countries.

Among these are Miss Else M. Roed, of Norway, who spoke to us in January of 1945. She will study sociology and economics at the University of Indiana.
