Public Policy Within Our Branch is Dead

Let's Put Life Into Public Policy at the Local Level

The Atlantic County branch of New Jersey AAUW is a group of talented and intelligent women who have historically gathered for social, educational and scholarship fund raising. It has not and does not engage in the making of public policy. The Public Policy section of the Forum is laudable for its regurgitation of National public policy issues and for the selection of current events analysis as it impacts women issues. Yet, this seems a superficial task each month when writing about "public policy" for Forum.

I suggest a change.

Simply restating the issues of concern to women without any real input by our local branch members does nothing to further the interests of women at a local level. Additionally, I propose that our group speak out about policies important to women and girls to leading members of our community and State. Without our voices, without our input, how will invaluable legislation at the local and State level ever be influenced by us?

Our ideas, thoughts, concerns can be channeled into effective public policy action plans. Public Policy necessarily involves work that should connect and rally advocates at the local, state, national, and even global levels to advance our positions to empower women and girls. With the member-endorsed Public Policy Priorities as our guide, we, at the branch level could, indeed, should embark on lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women.

I propose that we, as a branch, move in the direction of permitting our members to organize an effective public policy committee that seeks the input from our members and from leaders in the community to identify problems and matters of concern with the aim of formulating and implementing policies pertaining to the advancement of women. The Atlantic County Branch of the AAUW could, through its Public Policy Committee, lead lobbying and grassroots efforts to truly advance women.




