# President's Message

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For the past month and counting, peaceful marchers around the entire world have protested the inhumane police killing of George Floyd and of so many other Black men. They and we shout our affirmation that Black Lives Matter. For some of us, our days of marching in protests for justice are behind us; but our Branch has helped us express our outrage and our determination to be part of the solution in other ways. One or more of these options may speak to you.

1. I am immensely proud that our AAUW Branch Board of Directors was, I believe, the first AAUW entity to approve public release of our opposition to system racism, our support for Black Lives Matter and our recognition that those of us who are White and want to be part of the solution, need to learn how to be antiracists. Our letter was published as the Editorial of The Press of AC on June 12th. See copy here and readable copy at the end of the Forum.



- 2. Carolyn Bassett's "For a Just Society" group continues its bi-weekly study of these issues, begun in 2019.
- 3. Rosalind Norrell-Nance is leading the reopening and revival of STAR, Sisters Together Against Racism, which began 24 years ago.
- 4. In every discussion I hear our women yearning for ways to become part of the solution to the racial, economic and educational injustice that has fueled the marches everywhere. Read Jackie's Program Report to learn what else we are planning to make sure that AAUW is part of the solution.

And finally, a reality check.

Running and growing our Branch, especially during the Covid-19 pandemic, has brought new expenses. We purchased the professional level Zoom (unlimited meeting time and participants, breakout rooms, shared screens, etc.), at \$15 @ month for non-profits. And we purchased a shared interest (with the Clayathon group) for an advanced mail management and flyer creation program called Constant Contact (CC). Fortunately, after some negotiations with the CC, our shared cost will be only \$13 per month for each organization, but other expenses continue even during the shutdown. So please pay your \$79 National dues (of which we get a big \$10 per member per year!) before June 30th. if you are able, please send Bev an additional contribution to our Branch operating account.

#### **AAUW Dues/Fees Tax Deductibility information from National**

The following is tax information to assist you with your personal taxes:

- AAUW National Individual Membership dues are \$59: \$56 is tax deductible, and \$3 is not tax deductible because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's Section 501(c)(4) (Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote) activities.
- AAUW National Student Affiliate fee is \$18.81: \$16.81 is tax deductible, and \$2 is not tax deductible (because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's Section 501(c)(4) Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote activities).
- AAUW National Life Membership dues (one-time payment) of \$1180 are fully tax deductible. NOTE: Branch
  members Full national dues are to be paid through your branch as usual. Individual members (MALs) Full
  dues are payable to AAUW.\*Branch/state membership dues are not tax deductible unless your branch/state
  is classified under the Section 501(c)(3) entity by the Internal Revenue Service. Consult your branch/state

Bias toward others has been fueling public policy discussion in recent weeks.

Some of us attended a Zoom forum earlier this month, sponsored by the National Coalition of 100 Black Women in partnership with Planned Parenthood of Northern, Central and Southern New Jersey for the first part of the Implicit Bias Training.

We were enlightened on the effects of racial bias on worldwide maternal healthcare. The speaker, Dr. Joia Adele Crear-Perry MD, FACOG, founded National Birth Equity Collaborative which provides research to promote healthier birth experiences and health outcomes. The doctor has studied the health outcomes of pregnant women in several nations, finding that race and poverty change the success rates in birthing. A fact I noted from the presentation is that the United States has the highest maternal mortality rate in the world among similarly wealthy countries. At 17.45 deaths per 100,000 that is more than Russia and more than Germany. The maternal death rate for black women is more than double that of white women. Her organization and others identify racial inequity due to implicit bias as being part of the problem. Dr. Crear-Perry spoke truth and provided great resources such as the Ibram X. Kendi text, "Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America."

Birthequity.org is the web address for National Birth Equity Coalition (NBEC). Their training sessions for strategic racial equity cover how racism shows up in levels of power, leadership, and worldviews, and how to identify and apply this knowledge to dismantle the root causes of health inequities.

# University women stand with those fighting injustice

(This spring, The Press asked community leaders for updates on their efforts as they fight for change.)

As our nation mourns the deaths of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery and Breonna Taylor, we in the Atlantic County branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW-AC) also grieve their deaths and the pain of all black Americans who have endured the consequences and inequities of systemic racism. We stand in solidarity with our black, brown and white sisters and brothers marching in all 50 states to acknowledge the obvious: that Black Lives Matter.

Our Atlantic County Branch of AAUW has tried to do its part to fight the pervasive culture of systemic racism in America by implementing the

following programs: STAR, Sisters Together Against Rac-ism was founded 24 years ago. The group holds monthly conversations that bond members from different backgrounds together. Field trips to underground railroad sites, the Holocaust Museum, Harlem and the home of Alice Paul helped members better understand our history.

For a More Just Society is a study group recently created for our members to explore white privilege and to process how we as antiracists can combat racism both within ourselves and in our society as a whole.

Tutors for a More Equitable Society is a new group where AAUW members serve as tutors to prepare people who want a career in public education prep for the Praxis test required for a New Jersey Teaching Certificate.

Our national AAUW organization, aauw.org, has long advocated in Congress for women's rights. They continue to actively support a livable minimum wage, pay equality and student loan forgiveness. While these issues affect all women, black women have often suffered the most from these inequalities.

Recently, the AAUW national president urged our membership to listen to the protesters, to learn more about their issues and to speak up for racial

We must be willing to challenge the voices and actions of those who would degrade, devalue, dehumanize and murder our brothers and sisters. We join with other organizations to demand justice for the families of all people victimized by rogue police

officers because we know that substantive changes in governance are required to stop the spread of unreasoned fear, hatred, racial inequality and civil injustice.

The road to change lies through the ballot box. In New Jersey, you can easily vote by mail from the safety of your home. Registered voters will receive return postage paid mail-in ballots or applications for ballots.
