Dear Friends,

We start Women's History Month by celebrating our AAUW Explorers Interest Group led by Kris Baker. After exploring several interesting places in South Jersey, they turned their sights, via the Hal Taylor Observatory at Stockton University, to the stars. Their host, Professor Joseph J. Trout, PhD, wrote in an email to Kris:

"My students and I often volunteer at your Teen Tech, Tween Tech, and Tech Trek (STEM programs), and it was great to meet the women behind these events. The work you do means a lot to the young women who attend these events, and who knows, you may just be hosting an upcoming Noble Prize winner."

Since 1917, 53 women have been President of our Branch. Each shared their unique skills and interests in support of equity for women through education. As an example, it was past President Linda Harmon's experience as an educator that informed her commitment to support and maintain STEM programs for New Jersey girls.

Beginning on June 1<sup>st</sup> a new president or two co-presidents will share their talents to the benefit of AAUW-AC. Currently, 25% of NJ AAUW Branches have co-presidencies. I think this is a viable option and the Nominating Committee continues to search for our next president(s), someone who's willing to explore new ways of engaging our membership and serving our community with a strong team of dedicated women working with them.

In January, the group visited the Gandhi Peace Center and Museum in Atlantic City for a private tour hosted by three members of the center. On February 24, we visited the Harold E. Taylor Observatory at Stockton University in Galloway to see the new telescope. An explanation was given by Physics professor Joseph Trout.

Friday March 24 at 1:30: In Egg Harbor City is the little known Roundhouse Museum, located at 533 London Ave. We will learn about the German heritage of that city and their wine, boat and clothing industries. The building is the last remaining building of Dr. Smith's Neutral Waters Health Spa (a spa in EHC!!!) built about 1905. A former "vapor house", it is on the state and National Registers of

Historic Places. There is parking available, carpooling can be arranged and the museum is wheelchair accessible. There is no cost for the tour. This tour was arranged by Lorraine Stoughton, a member of the group. Afterwards, for those interested there is a Mayor's Walk that is 2 miles long. The Peace Pilgrim Park is located across the street from the museum.


