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AAUW STEM outreach has a full program this year in Atlantic County:

TWEEN TECH hosted on Wednesday, January 3, 2024, at Stockton University, had an impressive AAUW volunteer turnout! Many thanks to all for your participation.

TEEN TECH on Friday May 10, 2024, at Atlantic Cape Community College. Teentech is a one-day event designed to demonstrate that STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education and careers are exciting, relevant, and accessible to girls and women. Teentech participants engage in laboratory, engineering, and math workshops presented at a host college/university, giving them confidence-building experiences in a real college setting. The event is run on a school day as an approved school field trip from each attending district. The educators who accompany the girls participate in their own hands-on workshop in the morning and a panel discussion session in the afternoon.

TECH TREK the week of July 21-27,2024, at Stockton University. This one-week, residential, hands-on STEM camp for rising eighth-grade girls got its start more than 20 years ago. New Jersey joined the expansion at Stockton University and expanded to host 60 girls. Campers take part in activities like programming robots, extracting their own DNA, formulating lip gloss in a chemistry lab, visiting the FAA Technical Center or e-Sports Lab or coastal waters or Pinelands Preserve, and much more! Tech Trek has been shown to significantly increase girls' selfconfidence and their interest in and excitement about the STEM fields, which is why AAUW New Jersey continues to host Tech Trek at Stockton University each year.

suffragist parade in 1913 in Washington, D.C. as the only black woman in the Illinois delegation. She marched with this group despite being requested at the last moment to move to the back of the procession with the segregated contingent. She referred to Susan B. Anthony as her "dear good friend" when they debated in 1894 about keeping African-American women at bay for convenience.

And lest we forget Susan B. Anthony Day on February 15!

National Wear Red Day is February 2 and on that note, let's support AtlantiCare's 15th Annual Red Dress/Red Tie Reception on Thursday, February 8, 2024 – dedicated to raising awareness about heart disease in

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Effective Advocacy

We AAUW members are, by definition, highly educated. Our chapter's many stimulating programs inform and encourage us to be "lifetime learners". AAUW National urges us to "take action" to influence politicians and voters. The foundation for effective advocacy is knowing every vote taken by and every public statement uttered by an incombent politician.

Fortunately, we no longer need to spend weeks reading old newspapers on microfiche as I did while working on Bill Hughes' 1973 campaign for Congress! So here are the 3 best internet research tools I've found in a lifetime of advocacy. Please let me know if you try them out and what your learn by doing so!

1. Ballotpedia.org. It's free, fast and a few clicks reveal the number and title of every bill sponsored, cosponsored or voted upon by an incumbent and how he/she voted. Another click on the bill's number provides a summary, full text and much more. Also, the representative's home page even reveals the legislator's leadership status and effectiveness.

2. BillTrack50 is a comprehensive search tool for state and federal legislation and regulations. Pick a topic (e.g. guns, abortion, climate) and this site assembles your search's results into a spreadsheet-style grid for you to view and study. Want to share the results with others? BillTrack50 gives you lists, maps, tables, scorecards, even a phone app. to help you keep others informed.

3. Congress.gov is huge, comprehensive, and a bit more challenging to navigate.
