AAUW National has long supported and urged the adoption of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) proposed in 1923 and passed by Congress in 1972. The 24 words of the ERA don't sound very radical: It would provide that "equality of rights and the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex." So why don't women and men have equal rights under the United States Constitution today?

A full answer would require a dissertation, not a few paragraphs in our newsletter, so here are the highlights, (or low lights).

- The proposed ERA required that 38 state legislatures adopt the ERA within seven months of passage, and three of the 38 almost all-male legislatures did so in time to meet that deadline.
- · In February 2020 the House of Representatives voted to remove the deadline and the Attorneys General of Illinois, Virginia and Nevada sued the federal government to overturn their prior opposition votes, arguing that the seven year time limit was ineffective, but those cases were unsuccessful.
- The 14th amendment, prohibiting race and gender discrimination, did not protect women from gender inequality because Supreme Court Justices such as the late Justice Scalia argued that the founding fathers did not have sex discrimination in mind when they wrote the 14th Amendment, which led to overturning many gender equality victories won under that amendment.
- 50 years ago, when Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg argued Roe v. Wade, she based her argument on the right to privacy, not on the 14th amendment for reasons that made sense at the time.
- · But the six Republican appointed conservative members of today's Supreme Court relied upon their belief that there is no right to privacy under the United States Constitution and that Roe was wrongfully decided.
- The ERA Coalition, including AAUW and 300+ other organizations, are working with state, federal and grassroots partners to advance the cause of women's equality in the United States primarily through adding the equal rights amendment to the constitution and supporting states ongoing efforts to ratify the ERA.
- · Our AAUW.org site and the ERACoalition.org have lots of suggestions for how you can fight for our daughters and granddaughters.


Dr. Claudine Keenan

AAUW NJ applauds Atlantic County Tween Tech event January 3rd

Tweens + Tech = Perfect Together



On January 3, 2024, an engaging Tween Tech program was hosted by Dr. Claudine Keenan at Stockton University in conjunction with AAUW of Atlantic County where 131 seventh graders from six area schools attended a variety of STEM workshops. The students were split into groups to attend their choice of two workshops; lunch was served in between, along with a continuing education presentation. The exciting Egg Drop Challenge was coached by Jackie McGuiness, an AAUW member and strong contributor to STEM events.

Workshops covered a variety of subjects: Build a Wind-Powered Turbine, Coding Your Sphero Robot, Food Chemistry, Oceans and Climate, Lasers and Lissajous Figures, [Maple] Sap to Syrup, and Upcycled STEM Challenge Lab. At the closing session, three of the student teams spoke to the group about their projects: Egg Drop Challenge story characters, a Wind Turbine Model and a STEM Challenge masterpiece: a Rube Goldberg Marble Drop.


