Wait until you receive your November Fundraiser Letter. This year 3 options will be available for you: STEM, Carolyn Bassett Scholarship & General Scholarship fund.

- 2) How can I be reimbursed for an AAUW expense that I paid for? Example: Items for Hospitality. In the cover email, you'll see a button that says "Payment Request Form." Please be certain to complete the form to help our Treasurer, Linda Karp, process the expense correctly. In particular, secure the signature of the AAUW Officer or Committee Chairperson who authorized the expense. They will also note which Budget Line the expense should go to.
- 3) Do we have enough money in our Budget for a recommended expenditure? See the attached Budget/Expense Report by clicking the "Financial Report" for our last fiscal year 7/1/2023 to 6/30/2024. This shows the amount of money our Branch received in Income and what expenses we incurred during the last fiscal year.

This report also includes the balances in our 3 accounts: AAUW Operating, AWOC for STEM & Scholarship contributions, and the Community Foundation of South Jersey AAUW-AC "Trust account" for scholarships.


Yet again, Tech Trek was an exciting STEM adventure for 32 rising eighth-grade girls who attended camp from July 21-27, 2024. Hosted at Stockton University, Interim

Provost and AAUW member Dr. Claudine Keenan and Camp Co-Directors Meghan Hooper-Jackson and Jackie McGuinness continued a very well-rounded program.

On the agenda were core classes of Art in Motion, Biotechnology, and Robotics, workshops in food chemistry, tiedye, lip balm, lasers, E-Sports, STEM Lingo (coding an electronic nametag), Quantum/AI, and a STEAM Escape Room. There were outdoor workshops, mindfulness sessions, a workshop on Business Etiquette and Communication, fun activities in downtime and a tour of several labs on a field trip to the



William J Hughes FAA Technical Center Campus. The campers conversed with women established in their careers about education, career paths, and challenges at the Professional Women's Night dinner, which was attended by NJ AAUW State President, Sharon Suber, and organized by Co-Directors Virginia Rettig and Jacalyn Shelley-Tasoff and supported by Atlantic County volunteers: Theresa Basquez, Lynn Caterson, Rona Kaplan, Gay Laubert, and Nicola Tasoff.



During the week of camp, Tech Trek was supported by volunteers from Atlantic County: Kristina Baker, Theresa Basquez, Kathy Ghanavati, Gay Laubert and Nicola Tasoff; and volunteers from Salem County, Marian Haag and Susan Remster. Most Dorm Mom and Counsellor positions were staffed by Tech Trek Alumni and Stockton students and Alumni.

Part of the focus for next year will be to raise the number of campers to pre-pandemic levels. Members will be asked to get the word out to schools, and especially middle-school science teachers, who can

recommend girls for the program.

VOTING DEADLINES-Atlantic County ELECTION DAY-NOVEMBER 5, 2024 Polls open 6am-8pm

Ways to VOTE

There are 3 ways to submit the **Mail-in-Ballots**: mailing by USPS, by putting in local Drop Boxes, or by hand-delivering to the County Board of Elections Office. A list of Drop Box sites is on the Board of Elections web site and is found on a card inserted with the Mail-in-Ballot.

November 5 - deadline for receipt of Mail-in-Ballots by Drop Box or in person at the Board of Elections. If the Voter has mailed his/her Ballot by USPS that day - the Voter needs to be sure the ballot is postmarked that day. There is a Drop Box at Atlantic Cape near the Security Offices on the Mays Landing Campus.

September 6-If voters received a Mail-in-Ballot in the past will receive one again and my not want it. They MUST get their opt-out form to the County Clerk **BY SEPTEMBER 6th.** The Opt-out form is on the State Voters Web Site. **Receiving and not using a Mail-in-Ballot is the main reason for so many** *Provisional ballots in Early Voting and on Election Day - 77%* **in Atlantic County.**

VOTING INFORMATION

October 26 to November 3 - Early Voting Period: Saturday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday - 10:00 am to 8:00 pm; Sundays, October 27 and Nov 3 - 10:00 am to 6:00 pm. There are 7 early voting sites in Atlantic County - the same locations as in the past.

Note that they are not necessarily the same polling locations as for the General Election Day voting. Lists of Early Voting sites are listed on the County Clerk's Election Web Site. If Voter has received a Mail-in-Ballot, regardless of whether it has been used or not, and goes to Early Vote in person, the Voter must vote by Provisional Ballot.

The General Election is Tuesday, November 5, 2024, and there are important dates prior to Election Day which the voter must be mindful of. This election only requires that the voter be registered - all party affiliations are eligible to vote and also persons with no party affiliation are entitled to vote. The paper forms mentioned below can be found by having one's Search Engine look for New Jersey State Voter Web Site.

September 21 - Mailing begins for Mail-in Ballots.

October 15 - Deadline to Register for General Election. County Superintendents of Elections will have evening hours.

October 22- Deadline for Challenger Appointments for General Election.

October 23- Sample Ballots begin to be mailed. All registered voters must watch to make sure they receive this Sample Ballot. *Failure to receive the Sample Ballot indicates that there may be a Registration problem.* Also the Sample Ballot gives the location of the Voter's polling Place if the voter plans to vote on General Election Day.

October 29 - Deadline to apply for Mail-in-Ballot by mail. This is all dependent upon the efficiency of USPS and the Voter risks not receiving the Mail-in-Ballot in time. Picking up the Mail-in-Ballot in person is the surest way to get this Ballot timely if the Voter waits until late October.

November 4 - 3 pm deadline to apply for Mail-in-Ballots in person at the County Clerks' offices.

Stella Hordes passed away on July 1, 2024. She was born and raised in Manhattan and earned a BA in mathematics from NYU. She moved with her husband, Herb, to Hartsdale, NY where they raised three children. She worked as a residential Real Estate Broker/salesperson and cared about every client and colleague.



She was a life member of AAUW serving as President of her NY state branch as well as state treasurer. She was AAUW Atlantic Branch Program VP and college fair chair in addition to South Jersey Regional Director. She was an active volunteer and generous supporter of local charity and arts organizations.



Things you might not know about her: She played a powerful game of tennis, and an even better game of Trivial Pursuit. She would hop on a bus to go to a Broadway show with a friend on the spur of the moment and she knew where the best restaurants were. She loved cruises and her pet poodles; even the poodle who ate her parrot when she was at work. She bought some of the most desirable homes in the area and lived in Linwood, Mays Landing and EHT during her time in South Jersey.

All meetings are at 10:30 at the Linwood Library. If you are interested in joining this group, please send me an email to be added to the list.


