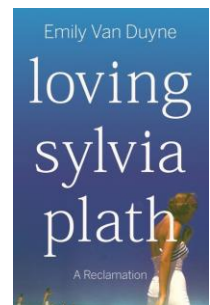

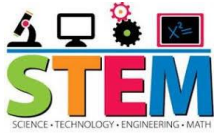

The State of New Jersey (finally) recently clarified guidance around their requirements for teaching certifications related to the Praxis test. While they are relaxing the requirements, as of now, teachers need to have held a 3.0 or higher GPA in college to waive the Praxis. So, for now we are working with a few teachers to help them pass the Praxis and we just helped a client pass Writing! There are rumors that the Praxis requirement may go away for good this January, but it is not clear. Either way, the demand for tutoring has dropped significantly this year for all the right reasons. Some degree of equity for NJ teachers may finally be here.

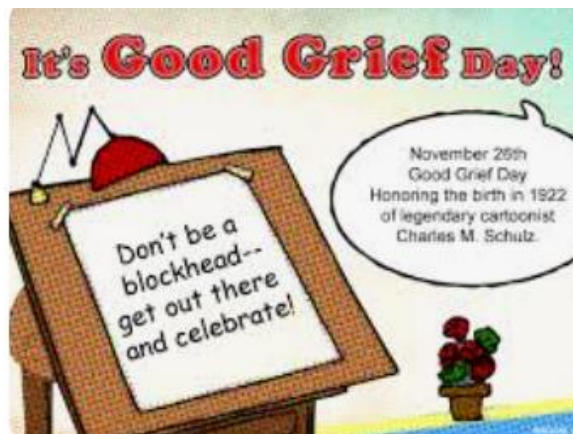

### A Celebration of Women in the Sciences: Past and Present



Our 2024 fundraiser serves two purposes: funding scholarships to students at Stockton University and Atlantic Cape Community College and offsetting operating costs for the three STEM programs for young women in high school and middle school: Tech Trek, Teen Tech and Tween Tech.

AAUW and the STEM programs have a positive impact with the girls that we serve. At Tech Trek, girls are immersed in a world that empowers and encourages them to think about themselves as future scientists, engineers, mathematicians, and computer specialists. All three STEM programs that our

membership volunteers to run and sponsor through donations are very successful. Tween Tech and Tech Trek held at Stockton University and Teen Tech held at Atlantic Cape Community college provided a proud variety of opportunities in STEM fields. In fact through our efforts, we impacted nearly 200 young girls, and hopefully elevated their thinking about their future opportunities.



The AAUW Atlantic Branch has donated over \$90,000 in scholarship money to local colleges in the past decade. We have prioritized specific majors, leaning heavily towards nursing and other professions in which the skills that are learned are needed in our area and jobs are available. Community colleges have become a lifeline for affordable education for students. New Jersey public four-year colleges are rated among the best in the country. Yet, college costs have escalated beyond what many may realize. Student loan debt has grown roughly 71% in recent years. Today, the average student loan debt amount is slightly over \$30,000. However, many borrowers owe \$50,000 or more. We need to do as much as we can to help enable women to obtain a college education and graduate without crippling debt. AAUW Atlantic County has a mission to raise funds to offset tuition costs for Atlantic County students. We execute this mission through this annual fundraising appeal.

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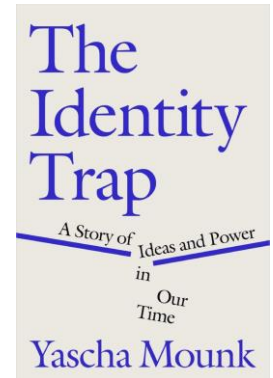
