

Treasurer's Report: Linda Karp reported the current balance in our OceanFirst checking account is \$6,527.57 as of January 22,2025.

Finance Officer's Report:

Jackie Shelley-Tasoff reviewed the attached AAUW-AC Income & Expense Report (see button on cover email) as of December 31, 2024. Overall, we're "on budget" for income and expenses for the first half of the year. However, we are projecting a \$1,463 deficit between income received and expenses for the year ending June 30, 2025.

The fundraising results for this past November were outstanding. \$2,612 was raised for STEM and is deposited with AWCO to pay for Tech Trek expenses. The current balance in AWCO's STEM account is \$20,980 that includes a bequest made by Stella Hordes of \$5,000.

The balance of our Scholarship Account with AWCO is currently \$22,262. A total of \$3,089 was raised during our November fundraiser. In addition, \$8,600 was donated in memory of Carolyn Bassett and \$5,000 was bequeathed by Stella Hordes. \$250 is designated for Salem CCC and \$2,000 will be maintained in the AWCO-AAUW-AC account for future deposits on events.

\$8,600 was approved for a scholarship to a Stockton student majoring in education as designated by Carolyn's family.

\$3,000 for a scholarship to an Atlantic Cape CC student.

In addition, the Board approved the following transfers from our account held by AWCO to our Community Foundation of South Jersey account:

- \$6,412 of prior year undesignated scholarship funds and \$250 designated Salem CC funds for a total of \$6,662.
- Stella's \$5,000 bequest as designated by her son.

Education Advocacy/New DEI Policy Changes

The Office of Civil Rights (OCR) of the U.S. Education Department (ED) sent a "Dear Colleague" letter to universities and colleges on February 14 to clarify and reaffirm their nondiscrimination obligations. The bottom line is that if colleges and universities are non-compliant, they risk losing Federal funding. If you would like to read the letter it is linked here.

Gloria Blackwell, CEO (AAUW) stated in her recent letter: **Taking Action to Safeguard Education**, "AAUW remains unwavering in our commitment to education and equity.

The first months of 2025 have been chaotic to say the least. People around the country, especially here in Washington, D.C., are deeply feeling the impact of the current administration's Executive Orders. I hope you are taking care of yourself.

AAUW is standing strong. We will continue to advocate fiercely and stand firm against any threats to educational opportunities despite the uncertainty we're all feeling right now.

There are many issues that may need to be addressed moving forward, but now and in the future, AAUW is focused on safeguarding higher education. We strongly oppose the likely confirmation of Linda McMahon for U.S. Secretary of Education, whose leadership would endanger vital civil rights protections for students. 
