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It is with pleasure that I welcome two new members to our AAUW branch, Shirley Dautrich and Quiana Lewis. Shirley was a member of AAUW in Pennsylvania, was very active and assumed leadership roles in their cooking and several education related interest groups. Quiana was one of our success stories as a teacher who participated in the tutoring initiative coordinated by Virginia Rettig. She is currently a second grade teacher at North Main Street school and as a lifelong resident of Pleasantville, she is giving back to her community. We welcome both women and know they will add to the vibrancy of our branch.

This month, I attended an AAUW virtual meeting for membership recruitment. A common goal of each chapter is to increase membership of young people while retaining our veteran members. Much of the discussion during the webinar focused on programming and fundraising to attract multi-aged members, and several of the suggested initiatives are not new to us.

Some ideas were as follows:

1. Partnerships with area colleges and universities, offering free membership to students for the first year. Recruiting students that are offered AAUW scholarships and enlisting them in developing programs that are relevant to them.
 - a. Inviting them to all events with presentations on financial literacy, job coaching, gender equity, career development, etc.
2. Trivia nights and Bingo events that appeal to all ages.
3. Holding a special membership drive that emphasizes "Shape the Future" and includes Women's Empowerment and a Woman of Distinction. (Some branches honor a woman who is not a member of their branch but has made significant contributions to the community.)
4. Social Justice and Equity in Education Programs.
5. A social media presence and face to face communication at colleges/universities at Student Activity Fairs.
 - a. Branch representatives speak with students about women's empowerment and the AAUW platform. We would have them sign up and indicate their interests, then follow up with invitations to events that reflect what they want to learn about.
 - b. Have giveaways at the table with brochures about AAUW.

All these ideas are worth pursuing but for our branch to grow, we need members that are committed to helping make these possible.





Looking forward to March 6, our selection is *Demon Copperhead* by Barbara Kingsolver. Jackie Shelley will lead. New people are always welcome.


